# DEAR FRIENDS OF SEE,

This past year, SEE International has continued to transform lives by restoring sight around the world and in our home community of Santa Barbara. The talented and dedicated SEE staff, volunteers, and board members have worked in a truly collaborative manner, balancing warmth, positivity, and professionalism to achieve the organization's common goals. This approach has resulted in improved outcomes. SEE's work gives individuals and families the opportunity to fulfill their destinies and revitalize communities.

Our 2013 achievements reflect an organization committed to its noble and necessary mission. Milestones for SEE are happening locally and internationally. In total, we performed 11,135 sight-restoring surgeries and supported 139 clinics worldwide in 34 countries and in Santa Barbara County. This last year, the Santa Barbara Vision Care Program increased the amount of patients served from 1,247 in 2012 to more than 1,400 in 2013. Eye clinics are held twice weekly and each day serves 10-15 individuals who otherwise would not have access to eye care.

SEE International is in the midst of a productive and energetic 2014, with 83 clinics already completed. We are also working on a new sustainable approach to detect and provide early treatment for Diabetic Retinopathy in often remote environments. This is a very special joint partnership with one of our SEE Docs. We look forward to sharing more details about this project.

So much of SEE's future is about optimizing our humanitarian footprint and mapping the changing landscape for correctable blindness. Ties forged over the past four decades between SEE Docs, medical suppliers, donors, board members, and staff are increasingly strong. The wisdom of the past now shapes the future. The organization is driving forward and making an immeasurable impact. We are determined to make certain that SEE will continue to transform lives for many decades to come.

# A LOOK INTO OUR PROGRAMS: DIABETIC RETINOPATHY

In 2013, SEE International expanded the scope of its Diabetic Retinopathy (DR) Program, where early diagnosis, treatment, and prevention are its primary goals. SEE leads the way with an innovative and collaborative approach for Diabetic Retinopathy treatment. Timely diagnosis and proper treatment can reduce the risk of severe vision loss by 90%. Since the DR pilot program launched in 2011, nearly 1,000 people have been screened worldwide with many receiving laser treatments to prevent the advancement of DR.

Highlights for 2013 include working with clinics and training local ophthalmologists in Trujillo and Huamachuco, Peru and Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam. In total, 575 patients were screened, with 15 patients receiving preventative laser treatments.

SEE Docs train local ophthalmologists in proper screening, diagnostic, and treatment techniques for DR in order to

expand local outreach, strengthen sustainability, and increase capacity. SEE's main method of treatment is Pan-Retinal Photocoagulation with a diode laser. With the help of corporate partners IRIDEX and Ellex, SEE Docs instruct local ophthalmologists on the laser equipment and proper use for future and follow-up patients. This skills exchange gives patients year round access to diagnostic and follow up care.

Looking forward, SEE intends to incorporate a telemedicine component to its Diabetic Retinopathy Program, whereby retina screening will be done with a portable fundus camera. The camera stores images of the patient's retina and allows doctors to keep track of the patient's progress from anywhere in the world. The fundus camera will expand access to care by overcoming geographical barriers to treatment, and provide more efficient patient diagnosis.

## DID YOU KNOW?



Diabetic Retinopathy is a complication of diabetes that affects the eyes, caused by damage to the blood vessels at the back of the eye. According to the World Health Organization, **170 million** people are affected by DR and estimates this number will more than **double** by 2030. DR will likely become the **leading cause of blindness** in the next 20 years and will affect the poorest people most - already 80% of people with diabetes live in low-middle income countries.

# EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Education and training are integral to SEE International's efforts. Most developing countries suffer from a severe shortage of trained eye care providers and a lack of access to the latest technologies. SEE provides local ophthalmologists, medical students, and other medical professionals with additional training in high quality ophthalmic care as well as in a variety of medical specialties, such as treatments for cornea or retina problems.

Collaboration is critical in maintaining a sustainable global network of skilled humanitarian eye surgeons. It is quite common for rich cultural exchanges and lifelong friendships to occur as a result.

While in the field, traveling SEE Docs work with local medical professionals and engage in training sessions in order to improve skills and increase the availability of advanced eye care services in the region.

To ensure SEE's volunteer medical professionals offer the highest quality care possible, SEE offers Manual Small Incision Cataract Surgery (MSICS) training courses every year. These programs consist of lectures and lab sessions, and provide ophthalmologists with comprehensive training on the most current clinical practices for cataract removal in the developing world.

# A LOOK INTO OUR LOCAL PROGRAM



Established in the 1980s, Santa Barbara Vision Care Program (SBVCP) provides low income local adults and children with free comprehensive eye exams, medicine, and essential surgeries for eye conditions such as cataracts and pterygium. SBVCP also provides vouchers for any necessary prescription glasses, which are graciously supplied by Santa Barbara Eyeglass Factory, with over 1,000 pairs distributed annually. Since the program's inception, SBVCP has served more than 53,000 individuals who would not otherwise have had access to eye care.

Through the generous efforts of participating doctors and community supporters, we increased the amount of patients we served from 1,247 in 2012 to 1,424 in 2013. A total of 26 major eye surgeries were performed and 1,120 vouchers for eyeglasses were distributed in 2013. We are most grateful for the support SBVCP receives from Rick and Gregg Feldman at Santa Barbara Eyeglass Factory who donate vouchers for eyeglasses for those most in need.

Also in 2013, SBVCP held 2 special clinic events – Veteran's Day and Kid's Day. SBVCP's first annual Veteran's Day Clinic, held in partnership with Sansum Clinic, provided approximately 160 impoverished adults (mainly Veterans) and children much needed eye exams and eyeglasses. Kid's Day, held in partnership with the Eyeglass Factory, aided more than 100 children in 2013.

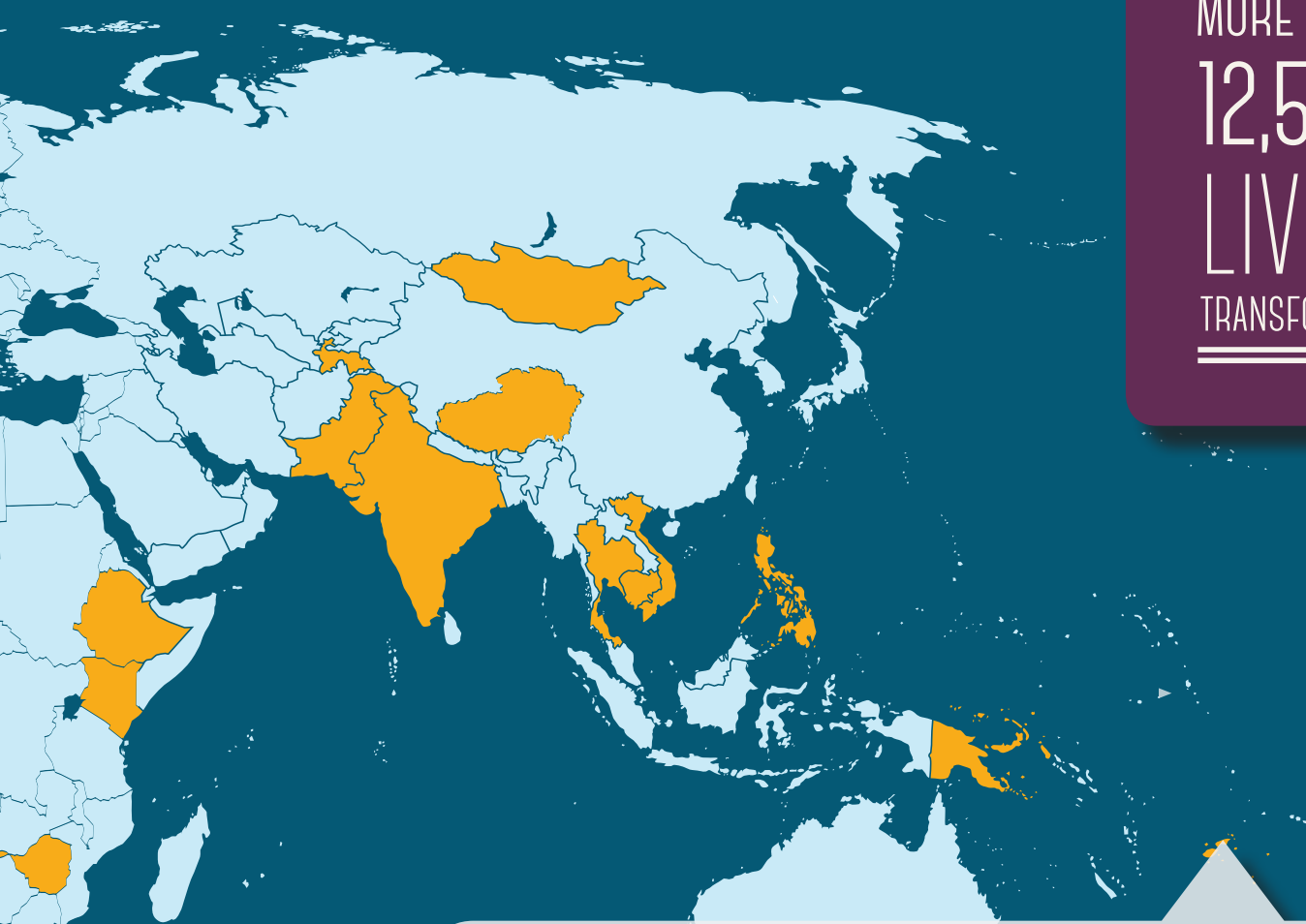

# SPOTLIGHT ON INDIA

For over 35 years, SEE International has returned to some of the most remote and underserved communities in India to work with incredible teams of local doctors, who are dedicated to restoring the sight and transforming the lives of thousands of patients suffering from treatable blindness. This past year, as Dr. Janak Shah completed his 100th SEE expedition, our photographer, Jay Farbman, accompanied the team to document the amazing and inspiring work of our SEE Docs, and joy of their patients, whose lives will be forever changed.

Local SEE Docs, Dr. Bikas Bhattacharya and Dr. Janak Shah, were joined by a local team comprised of an anesthesiologist, two operating nurses, and a number of student nurses eager to learn and help. The local team in India worked with Dr. John Willer, from the United States, and Dr. Rafal Nowak, from Poland, both of whom provided much needed humanitarian support and assistance. The clinics were located in Bhavnagar, Bakulia, and Siliguri, India. Our teams had a substantial challenge ahead of them, as resources were limited and the need was great.

As the teams' expedition got underway, the small waiting room at the clinic bustled with nervous parents and energetic children. Strabismus, cataract, corneal ulcer, and glaucoma patients walked into the room that day, all hopeful

to meet the SEE team who had come to provide necessary, but previously unattainable care. Over one hundred children were examined at the Bhavnagar clinic to determine whose condition was the most critical and in need of urgent care. Due to the sheer volume of potential patients, screening is necessary to ensure those with the greatest need for immediate care receive timely assistance.

Blindness is a critical issue in India - there are more than 7.8 million blind people in India, which accounts for 20% of global blindness cases. **Of those 7.8 million individuals, approximately 6.25 million cases are either treatable or preventable.** For this reason, SEE remains committed to its work to provide necessary care to those in India who suffer from a lack of access to care due to geography or economics.

In 2013, SEE held 9 programs in India, caring for nearly 800 impoverished patients. In 2014, we plan to complete at least 10 expeditions, providing more than 800 additional surgeries, including 250 pediatric surgeries. We know with the help of our SEE Docs, teams of volunteer medical professionals, and committed supporters, we can create lasting change in India - while the challenge may seem overwhelming, the results are nothing short of inspiring.

# SPOTLIGHT ON CAMBODIA

One morning 17 years ago, Tes Pha, a Cambodian woman, was quietly cooking breakfast in the yard of her house when, out of nowhere, she “felt liquid pouring over her head.” In a split second her life drastically changed. Someone had thrown acid on her. It was an incredible, horrific act that would scar her for life, forever changing her appearance, but also instantly forcing her into a sightless world.

As the attacker ran off, Pha’s screams brought her mother who could only think to pour bottle after bottle of water on Pha’s head to ease the searing burning. It couldn’t help at all.

Tes said, “My hair fell off; my skin from my head to toe changed,” creating a horrible, frightening, and overwhelming situation. Because it is known in her part of the world that acid attackers generally aim their deadly weapon at a victim’s face to cause the most harm, her eyes bear much of the damage. On average, one in four victims of acid attacks who seeks treatment is partially or fully blind.

In April 2013, however, she became one of the first acid attack victims in Cambodia to receive a successful cornea transplant, thanks to SEE International’s surgical team.

Cornea transplants are rare in Cambodia, due to the lack of organ banks, high cost of surgery, and limited ophthalmologists with the proper training.

Her transplant was made possible by Dr. Kevin Winkle, an Alaska-based ophthalmologist who brought a cornea from the United States and led the operation. The surgery was risky because acid attack victims are unlikely candidates for cornea transplants due to the severe damage and scarring around the cornea. Fortunately, Tes had sufficient stem cells and healthy tissue, making her an eligible candidate for the transplant.

Two months after her surgery, her left eye had mostly accepted the new cornea, and she has regained vision.

"There have been many surgeries," reflects Tes of her turns on the operating table in recent years. "I'm now able to work at home, to clean and wash. So I feel much better."

For the first time in almost two decades she can move around on her own, cook for herself, and, most importantly, see her family. In fact, she was able to see one of her sons get married in May, and now is thinking positively about the future.

# SPOTLIGHT ON PERU



The year 2013 marked the second year of collaboration between SEE International and non-profit, A Promise to Peru, for a joint program in Urubamba, a small town in southern Peru. The program provided comprehensive eye care, as well as general medical care to a variety of underserved people, many of whom were part of the indigenous Quechuan population. The joint team consisted of: ophthalmologists and physicians of various specialties; nurses and surgical technicians; and, medical, optometric, and public health students. Among the many types of care provided during that program, 50 sight restoring surgeries, primarily cataract removal, were performed.

One patient we had the opportunity to meet was a Quechuan woman who came to be affectionately known as “Mamacita.” She arrived from a remote mountain town in the Andes. Hunched, barefoot, and attempting to walk with two walking sticks, Mamacita was assisted into the operating room by the nurse and physician. The surgery went well, and when she came out she sat right

down on the floor, where she felt the most comfortable. Since walking was so difficult, overnight lodging was arranged, and the next day she arrived by wheelchair smiling and ready for her post-op examination. She was still barefoot, wearing a plethora of sweaters over her colorful alpaca skirt. When she pulled off her hat, Mamacita took out a 5 pound bag of fingerling potatoes and insisted that the team take them. The team graciously accepted the generous gift and used them to help create a meal for the children at a nearby elementary school. The beauty of her stoic soul shined through her bright smile and new found vision.

SEE and A Promise for Peru returned from Peru during the summer of 2014. We would like to acknowledge the tremendous support of Dr. Debra Messina, Dr. Michael Sable, and the entire team in making a difference in the lives of the patients of rural Peru.

# OUR SURGICAL TEAMS

SEE International's global effort to treat preventable blindness would not be possible without our vital partnerships. With the help of over 600 volunteer ophthalmologists from around the world, we have performed more than 400,000 since our founding in 1974.

We offer ophthalmic care to adults and children who are among the world's most in need and underserved. With developing countries constituting 90% of the 39 million individuals with severe visual impairment in the world, 80% of which is either preventable or curable, the need for this kind of work is immense. The surgeries performed are primarily to extract cataracts, which are the cause of over 50% of cases of global blindness.\*

Our talented surgical teams volunteer their time and skills for expeditions lasting 3-5 days. Over the course of an expedition, they perform 50-100 surgeries and lead educational seminars. In addition to taking time away from their own practices, the generous surgeons, nurses, and surgical technicians are responsible for their travel expenses.

A key component to the surgical team is the host ophthalmologist who resides in-country near the expedition site and lends his or her surgical skills. The local surgeon also pre-screens patients and provides both immediate and long term post-operative care to ensure that individuals receive necessary ongoing treatment. Host ophthalmologists also receive approval from local health and civic authorities, provide transport to and from the airport for the traveling SEE Docs, as well as arrange in-country housing.

SEE International is tremendously appreciative of all the wonderful ophthalmologists and nurses who are truly dedicated to furthering our mission around the world.

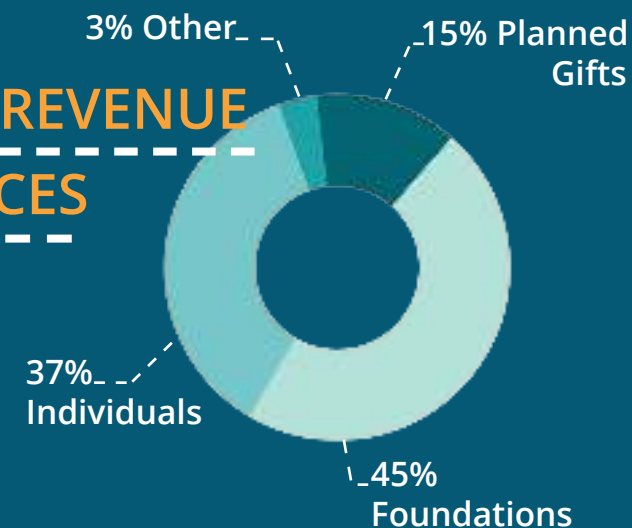
